Key Books in Tanakh: Sefer Shoftim/Judges The cycle of the period of the Judges spans several hundred years from the days of Joshua to the prophet Samuel. In the absence of strong, central leadership, individuals rose up to meet the challenges facing the nation. Some of these leaders are larger than life, such as Samson and Deborah, while others' stories are less known yet compelling and thought provoking. Through learning the book of Shoftim, we will compare and contrast these diverse leaders and gain an understanding of this liminal period in Jewish history.

The Hart Yearns: The Inner Life of King David w/ Raizy Lichtenstein:

The book of Psalms illuminates King David's passionate personal responses to historic events. In this series, we will explore three major events in the life of King David as they are recorded in Samuel I, followed by close readings of three corresponding psalms. We will focus on medieval and modern interpretations of distinctive expressions to consider the psalmist's powerful—and often surprisingly relatable—approaches to life's challenges.

She holds a master's degree in English Literature from the Hebrew University, and currently teaches English at Touro College. Kesher Tefillin: Join The Berkeley Jewish community and Rabbi Noah Greenberg for an incredibly unique opportunity. Noah Greenberg, an artist from Tzfat, Israel and Berkeley native, will be in Berkeley for the week of October 22-October 28. In this program you will spend a few days making your own set of kosher Tefillin (here is a short video of the experience https://www.kesher-tefillin.com/gallery.html). The ritual of Tefillin often times can be foreign for many people and difficult to connect with. Through this process you will get an inside understanding of what Tefillin is along with ending with a set of Tefillin usually costing (\$400) and you will have them for the rest of your life. Usually this project is done over the course of several weeks but working with Noah we are able to do this over the course of a few days. The workshop will take place at Congregation Netivot Shalom the following times:
